FAMILY COURT CHIEF JUDGE TO ADDRESS NCJW

PROVIDENCE – Family Court Chief Judge Haiganush R. Bedrosian, the first woman to lead the court, will address an open meeting of the National Council of Jewish Women on Wednesday, November 9, at 7:00 PM at the Providence Marriott on Orms Street. Appointed in 2010 after a 30-year tenure on the bench, Bedrosian will speak on a range of issues affecting children and families, including domestic violence and child abuse. The court has jurisdiction over divorce petitions, child custody disputes, contested paternity trials, DCYF cases, adoptions and juvenile justice. Bedrosian is a graduate of Brown University/Pembroke College and Suffolk Law School in Boston. She began her career as a prosecutor in the attorney general's office, and then in private practice specializing in family law. Bedrosian founded the Rhode Island Trial Judges Association and served as its president for several years. A former schoolteacher in Attleboro, she is a native of Cranston and the daughter of Armenian parents who fled persecution and genocide in 1915. Non-members are welcome.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL ENROLLMENT APPROACHES 200 STUDENTS!

Temple Beth-El Religious School continues to grow!

Enrollment is approaching 200 students, ages 4 through 17.

This year, we have gathered a dedicated faculty who are committed to sharing their knowledge and their love of Judaism with our children.

Our teaching staff includes:

Tonya Glantz (Pre-School); Paula Annenberg (Kindergarten); Marsha Horovitz (Grade 1); Nitza Attali and Sandra Lamchick (Grade 2); Jennifer Arndt and Nikki Hamburger (Grade 3); Avis Gunther-Rosenberg (Grade 4); David Arndt and Alan Rosenberg (Grade 5); Stevan Labush and Robert Oster (Grade 6); Robert Oster and Alan Rosenberg (Grade 7); Avis Gunther-Rosenberg (Grade 8); Laura Clayman (Grade 9); Rabbi Mack (Grade 10 - Confirmation); Anita Steiman and Rabbi Gutterman (Grades 11 and 12). We are also very fortunate to welcome our talented creative specialists: Judaic Art – Shannon Boucher; Music - Deborah Waldman; and, Computer Lab - Steven Kahan.

Curriculum in the Religious School focuses on holidays, Bible, God, Israel, tzedakah, mitzvot, American Jewish history, life cycle, Holocaust, ethics, and comparative religions. Studies are supplemented with music, art,

videos, and educational field trips. Librarian, Reini Silverman, is available each Sunday morning to meet with our students.

Students in grades 4-6 have the wonderful opportunity of participating in chugim, activities of their choosing. They may select from Arts & Crafts with Shannon Boucher; Computer Lab with David Arndt and Steven Kahan; Jewish Cooking with Laura Levinson, Stevan Labush, and Robert Oster; Jews on the BIG and little Screen with Avis Gunther-Rosenberg and Alan Rosenberg; and, Mah Jongg with Leslie Chazan.

Fourteen students are studying with Rabbi Mack this year in preparation for their Confirmation. Sixteen 11th and 12th grade students are enrolled in our Post-Confirmation program, and will participate in a Teacher Training Program and serve as Teacher Aides in the Religious and Hebrew Schools. They will meet monthly with Rabbi Gutterman for a discussion group focusing on Jewish issues.

Eighty-eight students are enrolled in our Hebrew School. The focus of the four years of our program is to increase vocabulary, reading fluency and language skills as applied to the prayer book. Our third year Hebrew students will take part in leading

worship services under the direction of Cantor Seplowin and Reini Silverman. All of our students will also be studying phrases and vocabulary of conversational Hebrew. Faculty include: Paula Annenberg and Estelle Millman (Bereshit – Grade 3 Hebrew); Sandra Lamchick (Shemot – Grade 4 Hebrew); Jill Bromberg and Meital Cafri (Vayikra – Grade 5 Hebrew); Nitza Attali and Stanley Freedman (Bemidbar – Grade 6 Hebrew); Rabbi Mack, Cantor Seplowin and Reini Silverman (Rabbi's Workshop – Grade 7 Hebrew); and, Marsha Horovitz (Mechinah).

We are also delighted to welcome our Israeli emissary, Noa Prawer, to our school this year!

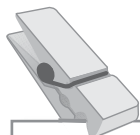

Len's life and career ended in April 2011 when he died of amyloidosis, a disease of misfolded proteins that deposit in organs and can cause serious illness and death. It is an understudied and under-recognized disease.

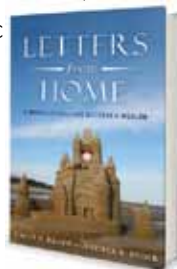

His writing has appeared in The New Republic, The Los Angeles Times Sunday Magazine, Playboy, Glamour, and Best Life. Since July 2010, his weekly commentary in Arabic, "Letter from New York" ("Risalat New York") has aired nationally in Morocco on Radio MED. He is also the author of The New Iraq (Basic Books, 2003). His latest book, **"The Honored Dead"** is based on four months which he spent embedded with the Moroccan police in Casablanca. The Washington Post has called the book "an ingenious, moving, respectful, and ultimately honest book about Morocco and its people."

TEN YEARS, FOUR REMEMBRANCES

A Nobel Peace Laureate looks back on 9/11, and what it taught us.

Ten years ago to the day I was in a taxi with my wife, Marion, near Grand Central terminal in Manhattan. Music was playing on the radio when it abruptly stopped. The announcer's voice took some time to explain that a major plane crash had just happened downtown. Because of thick traffic, we were still in the car when the second plane crashed into the other building.

We looked back and, through the window, saw flames engulfing the first tower.

Then, the second. Within the hour it was possible for us to see the horror in its entirety on TV: families' tears and officials' concerns for survivors.

This is how my wife and I learned of the gravity of the immense and monstrous nightmare that shook us all, everywhere. It affected us personally, too: someone dear to us was working on Wall Street.

Later, all of America and the world were witness to the tragic event that would forever mar the century that had just been born.

FIRST, I remember, that day separated humanity into two categories: the terrorists and their sympathizers on the one hand, and their enemies on the other. That the suicide killers were Muslim created an atmosphere hostile to Islam – wrongly: it is always unfair to generalize. What bothered us was that they had lived and studied for some time in the United States; in other words, among us. It was right to ask

ourselves: had they learned nothing on our soil, from their neighbors and acquaintances, about morality and civilization?

SECOND, on an individual and human level, our city revealed that it had a heart. Its generosity went beyond social, religious, political and other borders. Hundreds, thousands waited in line at Red Cross stations to give blood. Even though, through all means possible, we were informed that there was no longer even a need.

Even far from Ground Zero, passersby stopped strangers, offering them something to drink. Or to greet them. Or just to hug them.

Indeed, that day, New York outdid itself with its human and fraternal kindness. This is also part of what we should remember today. Yes, we must recall that it comes down to showing the assassins that they will never succeed in making us fearful; paradoxically, they succeeded in making us better.

THIRD, during the moments when the two skyscrapers burned, people could be seen jumping from the fiery windows. Like long ago...

Long ago?

Yes, long ago, elsewhere, in another time and place. In 1943, Warsaw. Strange, but I heard no one point out this aspect of the tragedy linking the heroic Jewish rebels' despair in the ghetto to the unfortunate workers in our Twin Towers.

Was it because the two events are,

in an almost eschatological sense, essentially different? And also because, for many years now, I plead again and again that one must never compare anything to what is – so poorly – called the Holocaust? But beware: I do not believe that our task today is to compare; it is rather to show yet again that in the history of humankind, everything is connected.

FOURTH, when speaking of 9/11, in many circles people forget to mention that the perpetrators were actually suicide-killers. Which they were. Which means that today the entire world is threatened by this category of murderers.

In the beginning, they operated mainly against Jews in Israel. Now they do so in many other countries, from France and England to Afghanistan.

If on September 11 the suicide-killers were adult males, today they can be found among women and children.

Several years ago, together with Norway's Prime Minister, Kjell Magne Bondevik, I organized a summit conference titled, "Fighting Terrorism for Humanity." Twenty countries participated. No speaker came up with realistic ideas on how to combat this new avatar of terror. My proposal, to charge anyone connected with suicide murder as guilty of a "crime against humanity," was accepted by everyone – except that no one explained how to go about it.

All the emphasis was placed on security. In this way too, society has changed: never before have so many men and women been involved in so many aspects of providing security for so many individuals and groups everywhere.

The fact that this commemorative anniversary takes place today, with such devotion and nobility – would it have happened if, for more than a generation, survivors hadn't dedicated their passion and their life to give the memory of this event all that it deserves?

Over the years, Sisterhood has purchased several films which we have included in our festivals. These films, as well as others we have collected, are available for loan in the Temple Library.

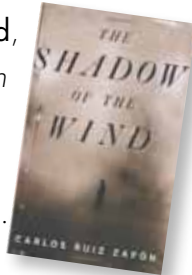
